
2. 1 large Couch

Bins for every student where their work, homework, projects, and writing in progress can be stored.




6. Crayons/color pencils/tape/glue sticks/highlighters for annotating These are essentials that should be in every classroom and always available to students.




7. Plenty of writing paper/composition books
